



The Strathbogie Diesel Supply - Use it or Lose it

We have a diesel fuel pump facility at the Strathbogie Recreation Ground, but it seems that many people do not know about it or choose not to use it. Refuelling Solutions (RFS), the company supplying the facility, has advised that if we do not buy more fuel from the facility, they may remove it because we are

not buying enough diesel to make it a viable proposition for them.

The cost of the fuel is competitive (presently 127.9 cents per litre) and some recent modifications to the equipment have made it easier to operate. Over winter the facility supplies alpine fuel which is not readily available at many service stations. Also, a small percentage of profits raised by the facility goes back into our community.

This self-serve facility is open 24 hours, 7 days a week, and recently, movement activated lights have been installed to assist with refueling at night.



It can be operated using credit cards or if an account is opened, a dongle is suppled and RFS will even do on farm deliveries for larger quantities of diesel. The instructions are attached to the inside of the access (black) door which is located on the front and it is easy to master the process.

Having such a handy facility in Strathbogie is something we do not want to lose. In the event of a fire, the recreation ground is a staging area for the CFA and they are very keen to retain it, noting that the next closest fuel is a 1 hour return trip to Euroa, if the roads are clear.

While Council put the Community Planning Program and associated funding on hold for 2020/21, STAG has continued to work on a number of projects.

Covid Community Grant

Funding received through Council's COVID Community Grant Program has been used to purchase hand sanitiser units for both the Rec Ground and the Hall and to transfer the community website to a new host. The Communications Sub-committee will be auditing the various sites and liaising with site managers re updates. The grant funding will also be used to refurbish the main board of the community noticeboard in Main Street.

Spring Creek Picnic Area

STAG is continuing to have discussions with Council in relation to this project, however there are ongoing issues that are still to be resolved. Of particular concern is the continued use by vehicles of the pedestrian path which is frequented by children and bicycles. Apart from the safety factor, this is causing erosion and damage to the path.

Township Signage

STAG received two designs for township signage last year however only one was received by the closing date. After some discussion it was decided that, as there are already Shire signs at each entrance to the town and the cost involved would be significant (and therefore prohibit STAG from supporting other projects) not to proceed at this time.

Two designs were received and we would like to thank those who took the time to submit them. Only one design was submitted within the advertised timeframe and STAG would like to display it at the picnic area.

Water Tank for the CFA

It is disappointing that the installation of the tank and generator at the Rec Ground, which was promised by mid-December, is still not complete. While the tank is in place the generator, which has been stored at Brady and Kibble since April 2019 is still to be connected. The CFA Captain also advised the recent STAG meeting that a high volume pump will be required to enable tankers to be filled quickly and efficiently.

Community Planning Review

Cr Raeburn attended STAG's meeting in January and, when asked about the Community Planning Review, advised that a meeting of all Action Groups is planned.



The Name Game: Flights of Fancy

Some scientific names of animals (*Dreadnoughtus* springs to mind) are a bit far out, and even some common names sound fanciful. What, for instance, is a Cacomistle? a Fanaloka? a Boky? Some puzzles to wonder about in idle moments. But it might be more entertaining to contemplate some *really* fanciful names – ones invented by authors for creatures of their imagination. What brought the topic to mind was re-reading the enigmatic story of *The Hunting of the Snark*, Lewis Carrol's 1876 long nonsense poem. His *Through the Looking Glass* (follow-up to *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*) provides us with one of the most celebrated of fanciful beasts, the Jabberwock. We know exactly what a Jabberwock looks like, because there's a magnificent depiction of it in Chapter 1: it's a fearsome-looking creature, with elements of dragon, dinosaur, eagle and who-knows-whatelse in its make-up. What's the source of the name 'Jabberwock'? No-one but Carroll knows. The original intention had been to have the illustration as the frontispiece of *Looking Glass*, but Carroll changed his mind because he was afraid that it might frighten young children. So a gentle and likeable character in the story, the White Knight, ended up serving in the role.

The Jabberwock shares its homeland with a number of other strange inhabitants. All we know of the Jubjub bird is that we should beware of it; the picture of it in *Looking Glass*, however, doesn't reveal what is so formidable about it. The Bandersnatch, on the other hand, is known to be *frumious* (none the wiser? – it's a mix of fuming and furious), but we have no idea what it looks like. Both the Jubjub ('a desperate bird') and the Bandersnatch (with its 'frumious jaws') re-appear in *The Snark*, but without any significant additional information about them.

What do we know about the Snark itself? The name is surely a mix of *snake* and *shark*, an eminently scary combination. The illustrator produced a draft sketch of a Snark, and it certainly looks alarming, but it didn't find a place in the book as published. Carroll freely admitted that he had no idea what a Snark looked like, and he wanted readers to imagine it for themselves rather than having someone else's idea dished up to them. In fact a small and partly obscured rear view of a Snark did sneak through, but the little you can see of it is more suggestive of a walrus than anything else.

Why the Snark was hunted, and what the hunters would have done with it had they caught it, are also matters of conjecture. We do know that there are several varieties of Snark, of which one, the Boojum, will cause you – if you try to catch it – to 'softly and suddenly vanish away, and never be met with again.'

Tragically, it turns out that the Snark of the poem is indeed a Boojum, and so ... end of story.

John and Julie Ryan's beautiful tree

This grand old narrow leaved peppermint (*Eucalyptus radiata*) is John and Julie's favourite tree on their property at Boho South. When the Ryans moved to their farm in 1985, it had more branches, and their children took great delight in leaping off a large branch down onto their trampoline below – a story that the family recounts to the grandchildren as a very happy memory. The tree must be several hundred years old, and is full of hollows, including a large one at the base leading up into the centre of the main trunk. Such hollows are often used by brushtail possums as den sites, and when a possum is in residence John and Julie always know, as their dog "Toey" takes great interest in the entrance but pays no attention to it at other times. While we might think of a tree like this as senescent, they are important habitat for many species - many small birds use the tree, and John and Julie have even sat quietly in the dark and

watched a family of owls in its branches – what lovely experiences it has brought to their garden.




